DUNCAN DU BOIS retired in 2010 as a high school history teacher after 34 years. In 2011 he commenced research for a PhD on the topic ‘Sugar and settlers: The colonisation of the Natal South Coast 1850–1910’ which he completed in 2013. Since leaving school teaching he has produced three books on Natal colonial history. In addition he has done research work for the Baynesfield Trust and the Pearce family of Illovo Sugar.
